Innovations and Best Practices

Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution:

- Starting from the academic session 2018, Kalyani University planned to introduce the CBCS curriculum in the undergraduate colleges. To successfully implement the CBCS curriculum, the college Routine was totally revamped as per the new guidelines of the Kalyani University. For the purpose of successful implementation of the CBCS curriculum, some of the teachers attended a few seminars and workshops organized by Kalyani University and other colleges.
- Nabadwip Vidyasagar College arranges for publication of Wall-magazine and the students of the college take active participation in preparation and publication of the Wall-magazine.
- The publication and the research cell of the College has efficiently published the 'Teachers'
 Journal' which is a Peer- reviewed ISSN journal. The editorial Board consists of Teachers of
 Kalyani University and this is used as a platform for interaction.

- The college is in the process of Digitisation of the library and E-learning is facilitated in the Library of the College. The college measures the footfall of the students through a registrar. This is proposed to be done through technology which would give more accurate result.
- The college organises the Sports of the college (in House and Field). The opportunity is taken to
 interact with the people of the locality as they are invited to take part in the event, specially the
 outdoor sports.
- The college has a Garden for medicinal plant which is looked after by the Zoology Department of the College.
- The college proposes to organise Parent-Teacher Meeting on a regular basis.
- The college proposes to organise induction programme of the students for the new CBCS curriculum and the new examination regulation.
- Interactive web sessions are attended by the students where the Vice-Chancellor of Kalynai University and other senior Resource Persons deliver lectures.

Best Practice I

1. Title of the Practice: Extending Higher Education

2. Objectives of the Practice

The growing population of West Bengal poses a challenge towards higher education. Higher education is at a cross-road too since the average age of the populace is comparatively lower. Providing quality education is quite a challenge for an ever-growing populace (quality vs. quantity). Nabadwip Vidyasagar College is facing asimilar challenge in following the policy of the government of Wet Bengal. The aim of the college is better education for greater numbers.

3. The Context

Nabadwip Vidyasagar College caters to the higher education needs of a large area of Nadia and Barddhaman. Located at the border of Nadia-Barddhaman, it caters mainly to a semi-urban population. The college faces a huge influx of students as the neighbouring colleges are more than 50 km away. Providing quality educationis becoming harder as the upurge of students is disproportionate with the number of faculty.

4. The Practice

Higher technology of audio-visual or multimedia enabled learning is employed in the "Smart classroom" where the faculty engages with the pupils regularly. Live and online classes with inputs from Kalyani University faculty are possible now with broadband VOIP and Google Duo enabled classes. A well stocked library is indispensable for higher education. Nabadwip Vidyasagar College places special weightage on its library. Lending and reading room facility usage is monitored both manually and electronically. Library work is encouraged in the class room too. Departments organize student seminars and wall-magazine competitions regularly. Career counseling seminars are organized by the corresponding committees too.

5. Evidence of Success

In addition to conventional class tests, Test Exams, Internal assessments and remedial classes innovative teaching and learning is adopted through interactive sessions, viva voce, home assignments, cultural competition, seminar, wall magazine, quiz competition etc. Seminars organised in this purpose cater not

only on the curricular aspects but also towards many affairs related to career development, legal awareness etc.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

High speed internet connection is required for online classes with the University but it is almost absent in the college. Funds are required for the same. A second 'smart' room is very much required for the College which can be proceeded only with the influx of funds. Regarding seminars it is observed that spoken English is another issue which needs to be improved upon. Thus language lab is in the pipeline.

Best Practice - II

1. Title of the Practice: Community services provided by NSS volunteers

2. Objectives of the Practice

Nabadwip Vidyasagar College is situated at a semi urban area and caters to the higher education and other social needs of the municipality of Nabadwip and the surrounding villages. It is very important for the college to carry on its outreach programmes so that it can have positive linkage with the society to which it belongs. NSS activities is one such programme where the college can outreach the society.

3. The Context

Nabadwip Vidyasagar College is situated in a very strategic tourist location. Millions of tourists visit Nabadwip and Mayapur during the year. During festivals like 'Rash jatra' and 'Doljatra' there is huge influx of tourists in the city of Nabadwip. Thus, outreach programmes are of critical importance. The college considers the NSS activities very important and takes up the matter seriously.

4. The Practice

Nabadwip Vidyasagar College is committed to perform community and social services under the National Service Scheme (NSS). The volunteers of NSS regularly participate in different social activities catering to the different needs of the society. The College had received grants from Kalyani University to conduct all the programs for every financial year.

Programmes are classified as general camps and special camps. One day programs are conducted under the general camp scheme and a seven-day long outstation camp, very close to college location, is organized under the special camp scheme.

The college have more than hundred (100) volunteers. Fifty percent of the volunteers are taken from the new entrant students and the balance is taken from senior students. Every year the college adds fifty (50) NSS volunteers from the new student pool.

5. Evidence of Success

College NSS has taken various programmes during the academic session 2017-2018 which have set a huge impact in and outside the college campus. (Details of NSS activities are provided in annexure-VI)

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

It has been increasingly difficult to induce students into NSS activities as the students are often involved in local club activities. Funds received from Kalyani University are also insufficient and falls short of requirement.

NSS activities (2017-18)

Nabadwip Vidyasagar College is committed to perform community and social services under the National Service Scheme (NSS). We have received grants from our affiliated university that is University of Kalyani to conduct all the programs for every financial year.

All the programs are generally classified into two groups: General Camp and Special Camp. Short duration program, usually one day program is conducted under the General Camp scheme and a seven day long outstation camp, very close to college location, is organized under the Special Camp scheme.

We have a very dedicated team comprised of 100 volunteers. Fifty percent of the volunteers are taken from the First year students group and the rest is from the Second year students group. Every year we add 50 NSS volunteers from the new student pool. We also take care of the proper gender balance during the formation of the NSS team.

Three general camps and one special camp were conducted during the last academic session that is 2017-2018. In addition some important days such as Republic day, Independence day, World AIDs day (1st December) and World Environment Day (5th June) were also celebrated.

Students' Feedback Analysis Report (2017-2018)

This report is based on a student feedback made by all the outgoing students (Session: 2017-18) of various Departments of this College. The feedback is on the present curriculum, they are in, and on overall teaching and on divergent College matters like campus amenities, infrastructural facilities etc. In the questionnaire there are almost twenty questions. Regarding the comprehensibility of the Syllabus, 42% of the students marked it as difficult or poor, whereas almost 12% marked as not problematic at all. They mark it as 'excellent'. Some consider it as manageable but dull i.e. 'fair' and a negligible part marked it as too difficult i.e. 'very poor'. Divergent opinions have been got regarding the 'completion of syllabus' option. Some said it is between 90 to 100% i.e. 'excellent'; 20% marked it in between 75% and 90% i.e. 'good', whereas 35% of the students marked it in between 50-75% or 'fair'. 90% of the students opine that the practical classes are done exactly as it ought to be, with proper timeliness. Regarding the choice of course offered, 65% of the students marked it as good while regarding the teaching staff of the departments, 61% said it good where 27% marked as Very Good. For the question relating to the interaction with faculty or 'Teacher-student Relationship', 41% said it is Very good where almost 26%

marked it as good. Regarding the 'Fairness of internal evaluation' almost 79% marked as Good and Very Good. Almost 65% of the students have considered that there is good availability of books in Library where 45% have marked the library services as good and 35% as average. Regarding the Computer facilities of course work almost 82% have marked it as good and something average. 62% of the students have considered Canteen facilities as good where 70% have marked the Recreational facilities as Very good. So far as the student facilities (common room, Drinking Water, toilet etc.) are considered, almost 50% have marked it as good. Regarding the 'interaction with office staff' 70% of the students have marked as good, 6% as Very good and 14% as average whereas almost 67% considered the non-teaching staff as helpful and they are happy with them. Almost 73% of the students have considered that they can do good interaction with the College Administration whereas 10% of them have marked it as Average. Almost 92% of the students are happy with the communication facilities, whereas most of them mark the 'hostel facilities' as very poor. Almost 55% of the students are contented with 'extra-curricular activities' whereas 85% of them mark the 'hostel facilities' as very poor. An average section of students (almost 50%) consider the medical facilities as adequate, whereas almost 63% of them consider the campus as clean.

Parents' Feedback Analysis Report (2017-2018)

Analysing the feedback given by the parents of the students it is found that all the guardians who attend the parent-teacher meeting, have been informed of their ward's attendance and performance. So far as the programmes for the enhancement of the students' personality are concerned, most of the feedbacks go against it. Most of the guardians are satisfied with the quality of teaching offered by the Institute but they have shown their concern regarding the discipline matters. According to them the Teaching-learning environment is good and so is the guidance from the teachers but they have found average conditions of classrooms, Labs and Library facilities. They are with the suggestions that more classroom, better equipments and more books are needed at the College. Regarding the extra-curricular activities, the parents have given an average feedback.
