Title of the Practice

Online Teaching-learning Process & Online Evaluation

1. Objectives of the Practice

In midst of the crises related to the devastating Pandemic Covid-19, it was impossible for the students to come physically at the College premises and take part in the offline teaching-learning process. So, to satisfy the needs of the situation, the authority has taken initiatives to stand by the students in their need.

2. The Context

As the College is situated at a semi-urban area and the students are coming from rural set up and below poverty line, it is not possible for the students to meet with the essential needs of technical gadgets like computer, laptops and smartphones. To cope up with the situation the College authority had decided to upload materials via College website so that the students can download the materials whenever they find it accessible from any other device or cyber café or so. Even the recorded lectures are provided.

3. The Practice

The academic council of the College has prepared a well-structured framework through Google Classroom where each of the courses and modules have been provided with different rooms where the students can access the online study materials, recorded video lectures, links of online live classes through Google meet, YouTube lectures; even the students can face and submit timely assignments and take part in online exams via Google forms. The most problematic issue faced is the network connectivity. The institution is trying level best in this area too.

4. Evidence of Success

It is evident that the jump into the complete online process of Teaching-learning is successful. In this academic session, through the college website all the internal formative exams had been conducted and it resulted in a huge success. Almost all of the students directly took part in the exams and the results were beyond expectations.

5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

In this online process of teaching-learning, the only problem is the gadgets and network issues. If the authority can help in solving these then it will be most helpful to the students. Along with this another problem to be mentioned is related to the psychological needs of the students; the students did not have the practice of studying in this mode. So, the mind-set is another issue. The Institution is taking initiatives in conducting seminars to meet the psychological needs of the students in due course.

Title of the Practice

· Solar Panels: Use of Renewable Energy Resources

1. Objectives of the Practice

In the present scenario when the natural resources are growing down fast, the coal mines are gradually becoming dilapidated and pollution levels are levelling high, there is the need to use the renewable energy resources.

2. The Context

Due to the increase in the number of ICT enabled classrooms and other electrical amenities and requirements of other electrical appliances, there is a need to minimize the consumption of huge electric demands. So an endeavor is required to circumvent the needs.

3. The Practice

The College has installed the roof-top solar panels to cater the demands of the electrical power. As the Institution is in operation only during daytime, so the On-grid solar panels will help to minimize the electricity requirements and prevent electric cut-off.

4. Evidence of Success

Through this eco-friendly technology indirectly we are facing success to reduce the pollution level caused by the thermal power units. It is also helping in reducing the cost of the electricity. Problems Encountered and Resources required.

ANNEXURE-IX

Feedback Analysis report 2018-2019

In this academic session (2018-19), the College has introduced an online students' feedback mechanism. The online mechanism consisted of a questionnaire, consisting of six major sections viz. academic activities, teaching-learning activities, Library facilities, infrastructure and campus amenities, Co-curricular and extension activities, and office service. Concerning the academic activities, majority of the students comprehend an above satisfactory result. There were also good responses regarding timeliness of practical work and internal evaluation system done by the college. Almost 95% of the students had supported a healthy teacher-student relationship where 80% of them were satisfied in the interaction with faculty. Almost 95% of the students had given

positive feedbacks concerning the availability of the teacher outside class where above 85% of the students marked 'good' and 'excellent' regarding helpful feedback on written assignments. Classroom teaching was considered to be useful with more than 90% of the students and similar activities concerning newly implemented CBCS curriculum. Considering the availability of textbooks and reference books at the library almost 15% of the students have given negative feedback where considering e-journal almost 87% of the students marked above satisfactory. Almost 40% of the students consider that the space and ambience in the reading room is adequate where mixed reaction was traced from the students concerning number of computers with internet facilities. A healthy feedback was found considering the feedback from the library staff including librarian and a mixed reaction was traced concerning requisition of necessary books and printing facilities. Considering the infrastructure and campus amenities, 85% of the students marked the number of classrooms to be above satisfactory where 80% marked the condition of classrooms to be 'good' and 'excellent'. There was a mixed response concerning the laboratory equipment and computer facilities where the demand was for more computers. A mixed feedback was obtained concerning canteen facilities, communication facilities, cycle stand, water resources, campus cleanliness, toilets and drainage system which needed to be improved and is in the process. Co-curricular activities gave positive responses concerning recreational facilities, extra-curricular activities, sports, NCC and NSS whereas mixed response was observed under career counselling programmes and medical facilities. Good feedback was given concerning activities of the Anti-ragging cell. The students have given positive responses to the student-official relationship, helpfulness of the officials, timeliness of office duties, getting scholarships.
